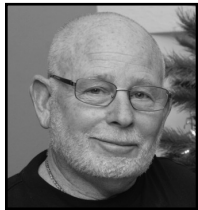

John English, "The Voice"

Our Monthly Musical audience is in for a real treat on Monday, April 10th, at 10:30am in the King City Clubhouse. John English, known as "The Voice," has been thrilling audiences with his Tribute to Frank Sinatra since the young age of 19.

John actually started his career many years earlier. At age ten, he listened to a 78-rpm Columbia record of Frank Sinatra singing "Stormy Weather," played on his grandfather's windup Victrola phonograph, and became hooked on the wonderful music from then on. John says, "The lyrics meant something and doing the songs he did had meaning." What could be better than "First Dance," "Fly Me to the Moon," "Embraceable You," "Come Fly With Me," or "The Best Is Yet To come"? In addition to the Sinatra material, John also sang in the Portland Opera Chorus for a season and a half. His rich

baritone voice was an asset to the Opera.

John's shows take his audiences back to the early years of Sinatra's fame in the 1940's; his years with Columbia Records, the Harry James Band, and the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra. They also include tunes from when Sinatra was with Capitol Records between 1953 and 1962.

His Tribute to Frank Sinatra has taken this classy pop artist to numerous venues, such as San Francisco's plush Clift Hotel, the Space Needle in Seattle, the Golden Nugget Casino in Reno, and the Sands Convention Center in Las Vegas.

From the Administrator

Hello folks! I usually have lots and lots to say, but I think we'll keep it nice and short this month.

Many folks are asking about our hours, not just for the office but those of the staff. With the exception of the Pro Shop, we are Monday through Friday employees. The office window is closed by 5pm and the maintenance shop is closed up by 4pm. During the Spring and Summer, you may encounter a crew member during the weekends, but they are strictly here for the golf course. If you have a weekend event

scheduled, you are responsible for your own setup and take-down.

And just a few quick reminders that the rules regarding pets and walking on the golf course still apply to all residents! Please clean up after your animals, keep them out of the neighbors' yards, and honor the restriction that walking is NOT permitted on the golf course unless you are golfing, of course.

Also, as you may be coming and going more often with the weather improving, please remember to close your garage doors if you

to slander a neighbor to undermine his or her candidacy. Remember, after the election we as neighbors must live together, we hope for a long, long time. If we want good people to run for our Board, we can't allow this to become an ugly process. Please don't be a part of that. Always vote your conscience.

Today is the 12th of March, and at the next Board meeting I expect we will completely change the rules for absentee ballots. We want everyone to be able to vote. This is what I plan to propose: beginning the day the official list of candidates running for the Board of directors is released, you will be able to obtain an absentee ballot if you are not going to be here to vote in person on Election Day. For our "snowbirds," you may request a ballot be sent to you by the office and you can send these ballots back to us to arrive by close of business the day before the election. The day of the election, of course, one votes in person. The

previous interpretation of this process was more than restrictive and confusing. I hope this will clear up the process.

I was told the other day that people are confused about the request coming from the Pool Fundraising Committee for donations. Let me clarify. We are building a great aquatic facility with new, expanded, vastly improved accommodations, but we are not building a Trump Tower. This means it is more basic than luxurious, so there are more things that we can use. Because we worked diligently to keep the cost of the center around a million dollars, we have planned for concrete where we would like to have ceramic tile. Also, we will have basic lifts for wheelchair-bound folks, but would like to have something more accommodating, maybe even motorized. The purpose of the Fundraising Committee is to raise funds from those who care about the pool and can afford to donate funds to make

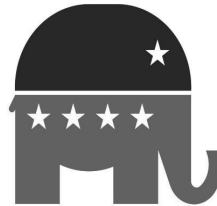
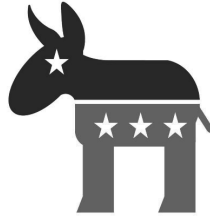
East Washington County Democratic Caucus (EWCDC)

Tech News

The big news this month is taxes. Yes, it is that time of year and the bad guys become a lot more active with email scams. This brand of fraud is called phishing, and the bad guys will try to fool you into providing your personal information to file a false return. Don't take the bait. Or you may receive a phone call pretending to be from the IRS to trick you into paying non-existing back taxes. Remember, the IRS will never call you. If they need to contact you, they will send a registered letter. Just hang up on the scammers or let the phone calls go to voicemail.

Tech Tip

If you have an inkjet printer, as most of us do, remember to print something once a month. You can print anything, an email or a document or even a test page or make a copy. You want to keep the ink flowing. If a printer sits too long without printing, the ink can dry on the inkjet nozzles or, worse, in the tubes that feed the print heads. Then the printer will not print even though you have plenty of ink left in the cartridges. Note: laser printers don't have this issue and can sit unused for years.
