### Administrator's Column Submitted by Ronnda Zezula

We have had some response to last month's Help Wanted, thank you to the wonderful folks of Team KCCA who have volunteered so far! We can always use more, so please put your hats in the ring if you have some time to spare.

Quick Poll: Do our KCCA Office hours fit in with your lifestyle? Please email info@mykcca.com and let us know. Sorry, we can't staff 24/7 <grin>, but we do wonder how many people need to come to the office outside of our current hours; and whether there is a solution we can find.

Where does the Lions Club fit in with KCCA? Many members of KCCA are as new as I am, so this month I want to highlight the relationship between King City Civic Association and the King City Lions Club. Mary Thibert, of the King City Lions Club, kindly provided us this information. Some of her words have been edited, but the information not altered.

It all started in 1968 when the Lions began collecting and recycling newspapers in King City. No one is still around who remembers all the activities the two shared in the early years, but there are some reminders still evident. In 1970 the Lions put in the flag pole at the KCCA clubhouse. Then they built on to the shop at the far end of the golf course. It was initially used as storage for appliances and large items to be sold at the annual flea market. After the sale was discontinued it became a maintenance shop for the golf equipment, with a small area for Lions storage.

Over the years the Lions have donated to various KCCA improvement projects, such as: \$8,000 for installation of parquet flooring in the clubhouse; \$5,000 for kitchen remodel; and, \$850 for new couches. They also contributed resurfacing the parking lot, purchasing new books when increasing the size of the library, replacing many coffee urns and umpteen stems (6 at a time) that kept disappearing.

In 2005 the Lions, after hosting free Bingo in the clubhouse for several years, decided to stop (as it was labor intensive and not making any money). The community badly wanted Bingo back, so KCCA requested that it be continued as a community service. Bingo was restarted with a charge to play, and has become one of the club's key fund raisers (except when the \$500 jackpot is paid out twice a year), funding the club's charitable activities.

After coordinating the King City Holiday Bazaar for 15 years, in 2010 Marianne Pfeifer decided to step down at age 90. In the absence of a community volunteer. KCCA asked the Lions to take it over (as it was a community favorite). It has continued to grow and has become one of the premier bazaars in the Portland area.

Many years ago, the Lions entered an agreement with Community Newspapers to deliver the Regal Courier. The KCCA Newsletter was printed by Community Newspapers and so was delivered by the Lions along with the Courier. In 2009 KCCA found that they could have the Newsletter printed elsewhere and offered to pay the Lions directly for delivery. This resulted in a considerable savings to the Association and was a win-win situation for both.

The KCCA partnership has continued in many ways; with the Lions supporting the Men's & Women's Golf Clubs, providing durable medical equipment for a donation, buying Christmas wreaths for decoration of the clubhouse, and providing BBQs when asked by KCCA.

In 2017 the Lions, through their fundraising activities, provided eye exams and eveglasses to 44 people in King City and Tigard for a cost to the recipient of only \$20. They also provided hearing aids for 2 people for a cost of only \$150. Several of these recipients live in King City.

In exchange, KCCA allows the Lions to use their facilities: not only for Bingo and the Bazaar, but also for Lions board meetings, district meetings, annual installation banquets, pancake breakfasts, BBQs and other fundraising activities. This support by KCCA helps the Lions greatly in raising funds to continue their donations to local food banks, school backpack programs, homeless and other charitable organizations in addition to KCCA.

KCCA also supports the Lions Honor Flight drive, where the Lions have recycled over \$10,000 worth of cans and bottles; enough to send 20 World War II veterans to Washington D.C. to visit the Veterans Memorials, including 3 from King City.

The 50-year partnership between the King City Civic Association and the King City Lions Club has been a WIN-WIN. Each has enjoyed amazing success in their endeavors because of the support from the other. We look forward to continuing in our spirit of support and generosity for many years to come.



### **Getting to Know Your Aquatic Center**

The process of building our new Aquatic Center began over 3 years ago and could not have happened without the countless volunteer hours provided by numerous community residents. First and foremost, a big thank you to all the residents who are so instrumental in helping to build such a beautiful new facility.

Stepping into the parking lot of the new Aquatic Center you will see it was designed with a steeply pitched roof, an open pitched arch above the entrance, and prominent gables to coordinate with the style and exterior color of the other KCCA facilities. It is spacious with a main pool, lap pool, large spa and includes a Family Dressing Room. Numerous windows allow for ample light for an open and airy feeling.

The parking lot will include two ADA wheelchair ramps and additional lighting for ease and safe entrance

into the facility. The South side of the building includes egress lighting between the buildings. for emergency exiting. The North side of the building includes the equipment

room entrance and chemical storage room. The East side of the building will provide access from inside to the outdoor patio.

The windows are a Prime Window System by Medallion Windows. They are double pane vinyl, which are energy efficient and do not conduct heat or cold. The multi-cavity chambers in the windows create a thermal barrier that blocks heat transfer. They are virtually maintenance free and includes a 10-year warranty.

The building was wrapped with Tyvek, reducing unwanted




air flow, helping maintain a 21R-value insulation, and comes with a 10-year warranty.

Hardie siding was used on most of the exterior building, which is rot and insect resistant and comes with a 50-vear warranty. It's made of 90% sand and cement, making it fire and storm resistant.

Roofing is standard 30-year composition and matches the rest of the KCCA facilities.

You'll enter through an all glass store front door providing the ability to see into the building and a view Continued next page



out into the parking lot before exiting, providing additional security.

The front entrance includes an electronic Fob card system, to allow residents and staff to enter the building. This system interfaces with a camera mounted in the front lobby facing the parking lot, providing video footage of door activity. An authorized resident with a fob card will present their card to a proximity card reader; the door will momentarily unlock, allow them to enter and then relock after a short period. Live and recorded video is accessible via the internet or smartphone by KCCA Administration. This system can be expanded to support multiple facilities within KCCA. The Fob card is water proof.

Lost or previously issued cards can be immediately canceled by KCCA Administration, as needed. This system also provides the ability for a complete building lock down for cleaning and emergency closures. Activity and audit reports and video are readily available for review by KCCA Administration.

need to be vigilant when entering and exiting the facility, creating a secure building culture. Tailgating is one of the most common security breaches. It starts out innocently – a resident opening a door and holding it open for others, allowing other residents to enter that forgot their fob card, the passive acceptance of a familiar resident or employee and providing them access or giving your fob card to family members for use of the facility. The problem with these lax to unauthorized individuals who we don't know are in the building. potentially exposing others to unknown and unexpected harm. unknowingly left behind or emergency personnel needlessly searching for someone who was never on the premises. It's important we each do our part to ensure security for all who use the facility.


#### Will the Assessment go up next year? We don't know.

### **King City Artists' Guild**

At our first meeting of 2018, the members of the King City Artists' Guild expressed their interest in reaching outside of King City to show/sell their art. Suggestions for venues included Beaverton Unity Church, West Hills Unitarian Church, Reed College, New Season's Market, and Sherrie's Jewelry Box. Members will research these venues to determine the appropriateness and accessibility of each. Members reminisced about the successful show at Concordia University in 2012 with hopes that this kind of show can be duplicated in another venue.





We had a great year in 2017 and are looking forward to exciting events in 2018! Stav tuned for announcements of new and upcoming events!



### **Forecasting Aquatic Center Costs**

At the 1/9/18 BOD meeting the Treasurer and the Finance Committee presented a pool construction project forecast that included a great deal of erroneous information including duplicate expenditures, inaccurate forecast costs, change orders for work declined by the BOD, items to be paid from donated funds received by the Pool Fund Raising Committee, to name a few. It's unfortunate the forecast was not provided for review by the BOD nor the Construction Committee before being presented as factual to the community. The report erroneously forecasted \$603,793 is needed to complete the project, including \$202,395 of open (unpaid) change orders.

A more accurate forecast to complete the project is \$398,000, as of this writing, which includes additional change orders approved by the BOD in December and January of \$31,955.

Forecasting construction expenditures requires some business basics and experience, such as identifying and tracking costs that can keep projections accurate. "Creativity" was used in developing the project forecast presented by the Treasurer and Finance Committee at the BOD meeting on 1/9/18. The forecast included expenditures from 2015-present. Expenditures approved by the BOD and paid from the Reserve Fund prior to acquiring the construction loan in

February 2017 have no bearing on the loan or actual construction cost of the Aquatic Center, except the impact to the overall project value captured on the balance sheet and depreciation schedule. According to the Treasurer's report we had the best financial year yet, bringing in \$340,514 from transfer fees, averaging \$28,376 each month throughout 2017. Real estate forecasters are predicting the market to continue to thrive through at least 2019, supporting the ability for the KCCA to continue Based on real estate predictors and last year's sales, perhaps we can forecast a conservative incoming revenue of \$25,000 a month from transfer fees, or an additional \$300.000 in 2018. The BOD has reported all major asset maintenance has been completed requirements are known at this time. It's unclear if the forecasted 2018



Discretionary or Nondiscretionary. Expenses identified may not be needed in the first quarter of this year other than the annual loan payment of \$80,000.

The Treasurer also reported that as of 12/31/17, the pool loan has a current available balance of \$67,018.03 plus a current Reserve Fund balance of \$604,898.56 for total available funds of \$671.916.59. Now let's add a forecasted \$25,000 per month incoming revenue.

Our Treasurer continues to recommend borrowing an additional \$200-300K to pav for the pool. I will leave you to draw your own conclusions as to why, when or if we should or shouldn't borrow more money.
