Steps in Electing New Members to The KCCA Board Of Directors

There are seven members on the KCCA Board of Directors. Each serves a staggered 3-year term. The terms of two (2) current Board members will expire at the end of May 2018, so an election must be held to fill those two terms. Here are the steps in this process:

Step 1: Identify candidates to run for office.

There are two ways for Resident-Members to get their names on the ballot to run for a position on the Board.

- The Nominating Committee: a. Nominating Committee members are Blair Wyatt (chair), Valerie Schuyler, Carolyn Griffith and Benson Meyers. The purpose of the committee is to identify at least two (2) and preferably four to five (4-5) Resident-Members who want to run as a candidate to fill a vacant position on the Board. Nominating Committee members will talk with residents they think would contribute to the well-being of KCCA while serving on the Board. Nominees who agree to be a candidate will fill out an Application for Board Membership and turn it in to the office by April 11 and will have their names placed on the ballot. The names of these candidates will be announced at the Board meeting on March 13, 2018.
- b. Resident-Members who are not identified by the Nominating Committee and who want to run for a Board position can have their name placed on the ballot by getting the signatures of 25 Resident-Members on a 2018 Nomination Form petition and completing the Application for Board Membership. The

Nomination Form petitions will be available in the KCCA office on March 14.

Step 2: Dates in the 2018 Process March 13: Names of Resident-Members identified by the Nominating

Committee who want to be a candidate for a Board position will be announced at the Board meeting. Their names will appear on the ballot.

March 14: Other Resident-Members who want to run for a position on the Board can pick up a Nomination Form/petition and Application for Board Membership at the KCCA office. Once they turn in a petition signed by 25 Resident-Members and the completed Application, their names will appear on the ballot.

April 13: Deadline for all candidates to submit to the KCCA office their bio (up to 400 words) and photo to be included in the May KCCA Newsletter.

April 23: Petitions signed by 25 Resident-Members and Applications for all candidates must be turned in to the KCCA office on or before April 23rd.

April 24: The Annual Membership meeting will be held at 6:30 p.m. in the Banquet Room of the Clubhouse. At this meeting all candidates will present to the membership their qualifications to be a member of the Board of Directors.

May 22: Resident-Members each vote for up to two (2) candidates to fill the two (2) vacancies on the Board of Directors. Elections will be held in the Clubhouse, times to be announced.

More information about the election, including use of Absentee Ballots, will appear in the April KCCA Newsletter.

Getting to Know Your Aquatic Center – Part Two

Last month we got to know the exterior of the new Aquatic Center. Now let's step inside and explore some of the interior.

Upon entering the lobby, you will experience hallways and doorways wide enough to accommodate a wheelchair and provide accessibility for the less mobile. In the lobby you will turn left to the men's dressing room, right to the women's or walk forward to the family dressing room, which is ADA equipped.

Special attention was paid to eliminating obstacles such as heavy doors that it make it difficult for those with mobility issues to move through with ease. The only interior doors you will encounter are the family room entrance/exit doors and ADA bathrooms. By eliminating doors an extra layer of security was added as any disturbances in the dressing rooms can be heard from the hallway.

Deciding how to equip the dressing rooms to ensure they will withstand the moisture that is inherent to these spaces required much consideration. Entering the dressing rooms, you will see that

durable materials of 100% polymer plastics were used for the stalls, urinal dividers, benches and lockers. Polymer plastic is impervious to moisture, immune to corrosion, won't delaminate, mildew, warp, absorb odors and can withstand non-abrasive chemical cleaners. The color goes all the way through the material, so never needs painting and scratches can easily be repaired. It's highly impact resistant, so dents and broken doors are practically eliminated. Graffiti is also no match as it can easily be wiped away with ordinary cleaners. In applications prone to high humidity. polymer plastic can save money in maintenance and replacement, making them an investment in the future.

The women's dressing room includes two private toilet stalls, an ADA bathroom, three private dressing stalls, a private shower, an ADA shower, a communal shower and a plenty of bench seating. The men's dressing room includes an ADA bathroom, an ADA shower, a communal shower, plenty of bench seating and generous general use space. Both spaces will include grab bars in

the locker rooms, in addition to the showers. hooks for towels and robes and shower shelves for shampoo and soap.

Inside the locker rooms you will find double-stacked lockers wide enough so a pair of shoes can easily fit inside. The lockers can be secured with a standard combination lock. Lockers are meant for single use, requiring locks to be removed after each visit.

The plumbing fixtures are made of stainless steel, which have a special oxidation applied to reduce rust and corrosion. It is important to understand that stainless materials are "stain less" and by no means are "stain- or corrosion-proof". The areas most prone to corrosion are those where pool water splashes onto the stainless material and can air dry – as opposed to those stainless areas where swimmer's hands rub up against the material.

Toilet room accessories such as toilet paper, paper towel and soap dispensers will be provided by the KCCA facilities maintenance vendor at no cost.

Commercial toilets and sinks made of standard porcelain materials will be installed. Toilets are low consumption. with an ADA height. Sinks will be



The walls surrounding the dressing rooms will have 4' tall of 8"x20" polished Arctic White subway tile laid horizontally and a 6" tile cove base, sealing the joints where the floor and walls meet. Above the Arctic White tile will be a band of 4"x6" dark blue tile, which is the same tile used surrounding the pool interiors, followed with an additional row of Artic White tile and finished with a bull nose edge. This blue band will provide the site impaired a visual line of sight throughout the locker rooms. The white tile will reflect the light, giving it a fresh, clean and bright look. Shower walls are tiled from floor to ceiling.

Options abound when deciding upon safe, easy-to-maintain and cost-effective flooring for locker and shower areas. The flooring discussion is as old and worn as the floors in some recreation and athletic facilities' locker rooms. Although a wide range of options exists - from inexpensive concrete and flow through interlocking tiles to mid-priced ceramic tiles and poured epoxy – the properties of various surface choices are about the same now as they were 15 or 20 years ago.

We explored various flooring options by touring and meeting with flooring

In the end, like many local aquatic, fitness and recreation facilities, the BOD opted for a more cost-effective flooring choice of grit sanded concrete. Grit sanded concrete floors produce high slip resistance and allows the water to fall to the drains. we don't seal the concrete. Although concrete is durable, easy-to-clean and fairly resistant to stains, concrete can stain because it's a porous material that readily absorbs liquids. Increased wear over time can occur and grit may need to be spot-reapplied. Tough as concrete is, it will need a periodic scrubbing. A power washer is the easiest and most efficient way to clean concrete and should be able to blast away dirt, mildew and grime with minimal time and effort. Proper floor maintenance will keep the floors looking clean, disinfected and mildew free. options for dressing room components and products, frequent supervision and cleaning are some of the best and simplest ways to make sure

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the dressing room environment stays comfortable and clean.

We need to understand that the more anti-slip the floor (or the more grit applied), the more difficult the floors become to clean. The texture that keeps people safe from slipping is also what provides the gateway to collect dirt and mildew. Granted we need to choose the right surface to fit the building's aesthetic, but we also need one that combines ease of maintenance with slip resistance as slip-and-fall accidents are a common occurrence, a huge liability, and most importantly, we want to keep our residents safe.

I have been doing a good deal of listening in the last month: on the phone, in the office and sitting in living rooms (as invited, folks be careful what you ask for - this girl can eat). I have been trying to understand our past more, how it impacts us now and affects our future. While the office tries to bring our administrative past to present times, we have had to ask many people for their patience.

Those of us in the office now have missed some things that have "always" been done. We often use the "wrong" words for things people are used to being phrased differently. We sometimes do not have requested information.

We note when we are told we missed something, wanting to do better next time. We are learning the language as we go and we are finding what information we can, so we can make it available. We often do not know something was missed, misstated or is missing until someone says something. Unfortunately, this is often in critical context. To help improve office morale a bit, as a favor: if you know important deadlines are coming up or have past documents (that are official), please let me know. If we say something confusing, because our words are not what you are familiar with, please ask us what we meant to say.

We appreciate those of you who are doing these things already. Even when there are different points of view, it helps to know what we did not know before. We are not going to be able to fix everything quickly. We



need to prioritize. December through June are some of the busiest months I am constantly asking people for patience, and I understand why that is difficult to give when many feel with us has nearly reached a limit, you will think of this article. This particular patience for overly long (as of March, about five months). We are in the office when you call, we are not ignoring you when we see the caller ID and we are not napping (yes, those questions have been posed phone line that works consistently. If

When I first started working here, there were a good number of issues over amenity "rights." Who has "always" had what space when and who has exclusive use when other events are happening at the same time. I am so pleased to report that those incidents have decreased significantly over the last couple of months. I am grateful that people are communicating with each other and with the office to avoid social collisions. I hope that spirit of partnership will spread to resolve some other issues. We are all in this together.
