## **Getting to Know Your Aquatic Center - Part 3**

We're on track to finish this project under the \$2 million mark from our 2016 Reserve Study, including the Crown Center renovations. From determining a pool's size to addressing its lighting needs, pool design is complicated and has many important factors to consider. Factors such as ambiance, types of activities, ambulatory/assistance issues and use of a spa and lap pool for therapy and rehabilitation all must be taken into account in the facility's design.

Providing a free resident facility that

accommodates aquatic exercise, lap swimming, lap walking, and open swimming that fits the needs of a 55+ age community is paramount to ensure its' success.

Upon entering the pool room from the dressing rooms, you will see the original pool is 25' x 50' and has a depth range of 3' to 5'

& 5' to 3' and contains 34,200 gallons of water. The pool was resurfaced, new coving and blue tile added and retrofitted on one end to meet current code. The pool includes multiple entrance options including steps which are deeper, more gradual and have double hand rails for easier access.

Beyond the original pool you will find the 2-lane lap pool where you can race a friend or swim solo and reap the benefits of a great cardiovascular, full-body workout. The lap pool is 12'x46', has a water depth range from 3'-6" to 4'-6" and contains 17,500 gallons of water, making it the perfect place to practice

your breaststroke, backstroke, walking or other rehabilitation needs.

Pool temperature was an important consideration in determining the operation of our new Aquatic Center - -The Aquatic Exercise Association recommends a

water temperature for older people between 83°-86° for moderate to high intensity and 86°-88° for low intensity water exercise. We are dedicated to assuring your aquatic experience will be a temperate one.

Of course, the health benefits from water activities is well known, but we took an additional step by designing a large spa for your relaxing pleasure. Studies show spas increase circulation helping people with arthritis have better movement and less pain in the joints, provides better sleep, offers stress and knee or back pain relief, to name a few. During the design phase, considering the benefits of a spa for our community became quickly apparent. Beyond the lap pool you will find a 12'x12' square, 3'3" deep spa. The spa includes 14 2hp jets and holds 2600 gallons of water. Recommended water temperature is 102°-103°.

Providing natural light and a connection to the outdoors was an important design element for a pleasant experience. In our facility, you will find many energy efficient windows throughout the entire pool area, providing lots of natural light. All the walls and ceiling are painted a light color as reflected light is more pleasing to the eye.

LED lighting is used throughout, projecting much less heat while being energy efficient, with a longer lifespan than their traditional counterparts. The level of humidity in our facility is estimated to be about 60-65%, as are chlorine vapors, which accelerate corrosion of materials. The basic configuration of pools tends to make lighting systems maintenance a difficult and costly job. For these reasons their durability is a key

Battery powered backup lighting has also been installed, which will automatically turn on if power is compromised in the building.

Ceiling height was given a lot of consideration during the design phase. Often spaces are designed with ceilings that are too low. The rooms may support their intended functions but combined with large floor space can leave the space feeling like a tunnel. Our pool room boasts 12'- 6" ceiling heights resulting in an open, spacious and airy feel.

Generally, the air temperature is set to 4°-5° higher than the water temperature. However, once the water temperature is set above 85°, then the air temperature tends to be just a degree or so above the water temperature. When swimmers complain about the air being too cold, it is typically due to air passing over their wet skin. Keep in mind that air needs to pass over the water's surface to help rid the space of chloramines, which can affect those with breathing problems. While the UV system will help eliminate those pesky chloramines, the air still needs to move.

Deck drains have been added around the perimeter of all the pools which will be instrumental in avoiding contaminated water from reentering the pools.

Each of the pools include an ultraviolet (UV) system for water sanitization and purification to control bacteria. UV systems utilize a cutting-edge, non-chemical process that uses light rays to sanitize the water.

Adjacent to the spa is the equipment and mechanical room, which is only accessible to the maintenance staff. Equipment in the mechanical room automatically tests and sanitizes the



water, although the staff is still required by State law to manually test the water each day and add chemicals by hand if needed. Chemicals are stored in the outdoor storage room and can only be accessed by maintenance staff.

Studies indicate that the systems incorporated into the pool area, from lighting to acoustics to indoor air quality, can be difficult to control. Since HVAC comprises 40 percent of all carbon emissions, incorporating the most efficient heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems, along with efficient operations and scheduled maintenance of such systems, reduces carbon footprint. Our Aquatic Center has a Seresco Dehumidifier providing 24-7 monitoring of critical functions and optimal system performance.

The controls are specifically designed to control swimming pool environment conditions including humidity, pool water heating and air conditioning. Our equipment includes a recirculating system that recirculates heat

back into the water reducing the amount of gas needed to heat the pools.

Older adults are leading more active lifestyles these days, and they are interested in facilities that support their wellness goals. Our indoor aquatic center is an important feature that will reach far into the future of our nice community. This is an exciting time as our new Aquatic Center will be opening very soon and I know you are all looking forward to jumping into the pools or spa with a group of like-purposed friends for a fun and social experience.



#### **Tech News**

The big news this month is taxes. Yes, it is that time of year and the bad guys become a lot more active with email scams. This brand of fraud is called phishing and the bad guys will try to fool you into providing your personal information to file a false return. Don't take the bait. Or you may receive a phone call pretending to be from the IRS to trick you into paying non-existing back taxes. Remember, the IRS will never call you. If they need to contact you they will send a registered letter. Just hang up on the scammers or let the phone calls go to voicemail.

#### Tech Tip

If you have an inkjet printer, as most of us do, remember to print something once a month. You can print anything, an email or a document or even a test page or make a copy. You want to keep the ink flowing. If a printer sits too

long without printing the ink can dry on the inkjet nozzles or worse in the tubes that feed the print heads. Then the printer will not print even though you have plenty of ink left in the cartridges. Note, laser printers don't have this issue and can sit unused for years.

#### Saturday Classes
