We are ecstatic to announce that after a LOT of work by the Board, the Construction Committee, and the Pool Committee that the KCCA Aquatic Center is now open! We hope your experience will be relaxing, fun, and memorable for you and your guests!

The facility is open Mon-Sun all hours except when closed for maintenance from 9am-noon. Hours for guests under the age of 18 is noon-2pm. Water aerobics classes are 8:00 am-8:45am and 6:30pm-7:15pm M-F.

A key card is needed to gain entrance to the facility, which can be purchased at the Club House office. Key card cost is \$5 per member.

The 6,078 square foot facility is impressive both in design and function and promises to improve and enrich the community for years to come. It's equipped with a 25'x 50' pool with an average water temperature of 88°, which is perfect for low impact swimming or just good old-fashioned fun. The facility also includes a 12'x 46' 2-lane lap pool with an average water temperature of 82° where you can race a friend or swim solo and

reap the benefits of a great cardio workout. Or perhaps you want to enjoy the relaxing benefits of the 103° 12'x12' hot tub and take advantage of a fun opportunity for socializing with your friends and neighbors.

As always, your safety is our number one concern so please use the pool responsibly and follow the KCCA pool rules.

The Pool Committee works in conjunction with the KCCA Board to address safety and maintenance issues for both the indoor and outdoor pool. If you see something that needs addressing, you are encouraged to complete a comment

card that is available inside the Aquatic Center lobby or contact a Pool Committee member directly. The comment cards are picked up every couple of days and reviewed by the Pool Committee, or the Board as needed. If you would like a direct answer to your concern, please leave your

contact information on the comment card and you will be contacted. If you would like to hear the most up to date information on the pools you can be added to the Pool Followers email list by sending a request email to sfuhrman57@gmail.com or we welcome you to attend our Pool Committee meetings which are held on the 2nd Sunday of every month at 5PM at the Crown Center.

Please take time to remember the Board, the Construction Committee and Pool Committee is made up of non-paid volunteer Home Owners that have done a lot of work and volunteered a tremendous number of hours to give back to the community. Just a Reminder

The Board of Directors announced the 2019 Assessment amount on November 27th of \$423 per resident.

The Board approved the 2019 Operating Budget on November 13th and the Reserve Budget on December 11th. Assessment invoices were mailed after then to each residence, in a yellow packet that also contained the Board approved 2019 Budgets and a list of event room rental and golf fees.

Copies are also available in the Clubhouse lobby sorter, to the right if facing the Member Services Window / Office door. Please note we are unable to restock the sorter during evenings and weekends.

The link to pay online is also on our website home page under Announcements. The office accepts personal or cashier's checks by mail, in-person or through the mail slot in the locked office door. Payments are due by January 31st. Thank you!

Requests for Age Verification

Members frequently wonder why we ask residents to verify their age, when most members provide proof of age upon first moving to KCCA.

A simplistic explanation is that HUD's Fair Housing Act (FHA) prohibits housing discrimination based on multiple statuses, one of which is age. To allow for senior housing communities. HUD created an exemption called the Housing for Older Persons Act (HOPA).

HOPA-qualified communities must comply with HUD's requirements, one of which is resident age verification. Residents must provide proof of age at least every two years. This can be done using various forms of acceptable ID or by resident signed "self-certification" (avoiding the need for an in-person visit to the office).

Failure to survey residents could jeopardize KCCA's status as a 55+ community. Why do we ask twice

a year? The primary reason is that many residents do not respond the first time, or often the second. Another is how frequently we gain new residents who are not owners.

To be on the safest side possible, we add an age certification to the two major requests for information that we send to all residents annually. In doing this, we feel more assured that we will have the necessary certification from all residents within a two-year period. We are asked throughout the year, generally by lenders, to certify in writing that we can provide documentation that verifies the age of all of our residents. Please help us ensure that we can do this, and maintain our HOPA qualification, by responding. Thank you!

Administrator's Column

Happy New Year, everyone! I hope each of you enjoyed a wonderful holiday season. I first want to thank our amazing member volunteers, which includes our Board of Directors, for their hard work in 2018, I also want to express gratitude to the dedicated and hard-working people on Team KCCA. Jeff Halfman and Joy Olmstead, who manage their departments expertly, and their teams

(in order of hire): Brian Luoto, Miguel Jaguiz. Teresa Nemec, Kevin Arguelles, Marcus Luoto and John Fulton (KCCA Team Jeff); Chris White, Al Veith, Mark Olmstead and Peter Ranslow (KCCA Team Joy); join the office team, Sylvia Cheney and Edith Alben, to ensure KCCA remains a stellar community. An enormous thank you to them all!

When I was first asked to share with our members what I was up to in 2018, I started by copying text from updates and self-eval-

uations sent to the Board during the year (I wound up with 14 pages, too much to print). I realized while culling it down that it is impossible to articulate this job both succinctly and adequately. There are many moving parts, none of the tasks repeat exactly and some are never really "finished" because they evolve regularly.

The struggle to verbalize what I have done reminded me of an article I read in October, "Coping with the Job that's Never Done," written by Julie Adamen* in the HOA Manager NewsLine (Vol.21 No.10). Julie kindly gave me permission to quote what she called her "aha moment": "... I would never be 'caught up,' because the job doesn't work that way. ... I would never be completely done with anything because the business is a never ending wheel of tasks and deadlines.

We're in community management, the job that never ends, the one that's waiting for you, the one that is really not a job, but a lifestyle. To survive and prosper, you must make this fundamental mental shift: Acknowledge the job for what it is. Do your best, do as much as you can and then end your day."

Even so, the work I did in 2018 was toward getting us to a point of some consistency (while also training myself - it was my first full year) and training two new office staff (speaking of which, the February newsletter will highlight Member Services Window goals now that our budget is in place). There was quite a bit to get done and plenty of unexpected twists along the way. One recent turn was the retirement of our beloved website and IT guru (we'll miss you, thank you!) Taking-over that role has added a good deal of learning curve and time to my days.

Due to article size limitations (and reader exhaustion), I won't spell out everything I've done or offer much detail. Instead, I am highlighting a few things that are beyond my everyday work. Everyday work is generally (but not only):

- Communications: email (about 85 per day on average work days, it takes 80-120 emails to get one newsletter published), mail correspondence, meetings (in and out of office) and phone calls with: office staff, managers, members, Board members, Committee Chairs, clubs, the city, vendors and our larger community.
- Approval of invoices and requisitions: either approving or procuring Board approval; after researching budget, proposals, past payments and Board votes (if required).

- Managing and assisting office staff with their tasks (answering guestions, resolving issues and training) and human resources for ~15 employees, except payroll which I manage with the bookkeeper.
- Board meetings: researching, summarizing and preparing information for upcoming Board meetings toward hitting required deadlines (with the opening of the Aquatic Center meetings dropped from 5-6 per month to two). Examples of a few major deadlines in a vear, in addition to routine work, are:

January-February: Assessment payment collection / documentation for ~1,745 members; overdue letters; update member, property and billing records; closing of the prior fiscal year and preparation of the current fiscal year; inventories; annual employee retirement benefit review and update; work with Board on deadlines / schedules for nominating, elections and annual meeting; gather information for CPA and answer questions for annual audit, property and federal/ state tax returns (plus reserve study in 2019).

March: Collect overdue assessments: answer CPA questions and

provide follow-up documentation; provide documentation / information and conduct property and equipment inspections with insurance company for renewals; begin work with Elections Committee on processes and notices; complete updating member information from assessment invoice forms.

April & May: Annual employee health insurance benefit review and sign-up; multiple meetings, calls and emails with CPA to finalize audit and answer management questions relating to prior and current years; begin preparation of documentation or information needed for annual member's meeting; distribute information to members on upcoming election and work with Elections Committee (and applicants); distribute and track absentee ballots.

June & July: Election and onboarding of new Board members; update government agencies, many vendors and financial institutions on new and exiting Board member information; update internal email and document storage systems for new Board member access (disabling exiting members); update multiple lists of Board members and Committee Chairs/ meeting days and times.

August & September: Employee annual review processes: extensive op-

erating and reserve budget research and preparation with managers and vendors for Budget Committee; request, collect and begin entering new information from members for next directory; update member property and billing records with new information.

October: Employee insurance benefit reviews and sign-up for all but health; research, prepare and present staffing proposals to Board for selection; work with Budget Committee and Board on budgeting questions toward adoption; prepare Directory for publication (seven fast turn stages up to publication).

November & December: Respond to questions (multiple meetings, calls and emails) leading up to the Board's approval of budgets and staffing expenses; finalize assessment packet with Board-approved budgets / fees and mail to residences / non-resident owners; update website and posted information with Board-announced assessment amount and documentation; begin collecting / documenting early assessment payments; prepare for year-end closing with managers and bookkeeper.

In addition to the daily and deadline work, there are projects. One of the multi-faceted projects my first year was - continued, page 14

Water Aerobics Club

Members of the KCCA Water Aerobics Club resumed their routines in the new pool on November 26. What an ecstatic group we were! All the agony of waiting was quickly dissolved in the warm, silky water. How good to move freely again!

If you have not visited the pool yet, what is keeping you? It is a beautiful facility. Perhaps you are not a swimmer and don't feel that it is worth the effort to get wet, especially when our weather is not friendly. Maybe the hot tub is the only asset you enjoy. Well, consider the benefits of exercise, which gets harder for older adults. If you know you should move more, but find walking difficult, give water aerobics a try. If you don't feel better after just one visit, I'll eat my pool shoes.

Joining the water aerobics club is not difficult. We have two sessions: 8 am or 6:30 pm every Monday through Friday. Bathing suit only thing necessary. We have two routines. One session requires use of a ball, which we provide. Some people prefer using noodles to aid exercises, which we also provide. If you don't like noodles, water barbells work very well, but are not necessary. Pool shoes are a matter of choice. To be clear though, pool shoes are put on when you remove your street shoes before entering the pool and are removed for your street shoes when you leave. If they touch ground outside the pool, they are no longer pool shoes, even if you parked right next to the front door.

The difference between the morning and evening sessions is time. Some of us like starting our day with getting up, out and done and others find it relaxing at end of the day.

To get started, we suggest you just show up, tell somebody you are new and ask who is in charge. Be a few minutes early, because we start exactly on time. Remember shower required before entering pool. There are several people at each session you can ask for a 2019 membership form. We communicate by email, so make sure you fill out the form clearly.



You would be surprised how many times an email is returned because an "u" was supposed to be an "o" or, what looked like an "L" was actually "I." Dues have been \$5/ year, but we will not charge members now until after our 2019 annual meeting, which is tentatively set for January 28, 2019 at 1pm in the Crown Center.

We encourage you to try several sessions before you decide to join. That way you get to learn if our routines are enjoyable and beneficial for you. Our routines are not difficult, but following verbal, physical directions can be disorienting at first. It will take a few tries. You can add intensity at your own pace as you learn and as your body dictates.

technology improvements. After performing needs assessments and office job and workflow analyses, I identified improvements to our data security, efficiency and future member services. I worked with the Board to prioritize needs based on cost (verses savings) and researched multiple vendors with services and / or equipment that would be compatible with each other and affordable (very many were fabulous, but not at all affordable).

This involved countless hours of research to compare features with cost and compatibility (I lost count of how many sales calls and demos it took to get to pricing information). From these I obtained and summarized proposals, for Board selection, in each of the following categories:

- Email and document storage (consolidate multiple past accounts)
- Property/member database
- Networking & phone system (Aquatic-Crown Center still in progress)
- Pro Shop Point of Sale system & website / online booking (team in trainina)
- Sound system for Banquet Room
- Accounting software (final stage)
- Payroll system (use tabled to 2019)
- Online voting system (vendor selected, now in design)
- Note: hosted server and calendar systems were not chosen due to cost vs features we need

Once the Board approved selections, I worked directly with the vendors to design, set up and implement (often entering data myself or managing and quality-checking entry). Many of the

Two new card

above have been completed, a few remain in progress pending training or the completion of another compatible system. When fully in use these systems will reduce hourly staff time (reducing operating costs) and the human errors made when entering information multiple times to different places (reducing staff and member headaches).

On the topic of technology, the installed pool building key card system had to be learned (and a process scripted) so our wonderful volunteers could be trained to enter information and allow members access. That information was also added to the property/member database, as a few issues arose with the vendor's system after setup. Those issues are being worked-through now, which takes time to document and track.

Beyond technology, 2018 brought an extensive need for research and information gathering. Among many other things, we needed to (in no particular order):

- · Compile member/property database information, eligible voter lists and directory information from multiple and different past and present sources.
- Research outdated LARC and member handbooks, and our governing documents, to follow through on processes with the appropriate Board Committee Chairs.
- Work with member clubs. Board members, staff, the House Committee, three ad hoc Board committees and now the Clubs & Amenities Committee toward resolving the issue of rules / fees for use of amenities.
- Investigate policies related to

member / public use of amenities and insurance coverage re: parking, fitness equipment, club memberships, events, BYOB, club gambling, etc.

- · Work with employment counsel and / or the Board to update / create: administrative job descriptions; employee manual and policies; employee review and multiple benefits enrollment processes; and, seven staffing scenarios for the Board (to approve 2019 staffing expenses).
- Use CPA's audit feedback to draft financial processes for Board approval (while the Finance Committee was on hiatus).
- · Research and write RFPs. summarizing responses, to ten area law firms for the provision of fixed fee services; and, work with Board selected firms on representation agreements.
- Research information needed to apply to multiple insurers and compile proposal information for the Board to select replacement: Directors & Officers / Employment Practices, Commercial, Business Auto, Umbrella. Earthquake and Crime insurance policies.
- Work with Greens Superintendent. House Committee and vendors to replace outdated or broken equipment and / or fixtures.

The above are only a few examples. I feel badly that it is so difficult for me to explain, in brief bullet points, all the work that goes in to about 70 hours a week. It is easy, however, for me to express my excitement over the benefits that the resulting improvements will bring to KCCA

Hand and Foot which is somewhat like Canasta and Kings in a Corner a version of Solitaire. Games will alternate on Tuesdays in the Crown Center beginning at 1:30 to 4 p.m. Everyone is invited to attend.
