Is It just me? It seems like we're into the Fall season a bit early. At a recent LARC meeting, four new potential members attended. For those of you who are new to King City HOA, LARC's job is to help ensure property values, explain the rules and regulations regarding paint, landscape changes, roof work and congratulate homeowners on tidy landscapes and yards.

Our meeting time has been moved to 9:00 a.m. on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month. We meet in the clubhouse and are usually finished in about an hour. Stop by and meet committee members, ask questions, and learn more about LARC.

Remember that if you are about to

begin a project, pick up a form from the rack to the right of the office door in the clubhouse. The form is self-explanatory and we try to return them to you within 15 days. It is especially important that you get feedback from some of your neighbors (at least three.) If your project application form is rejected let the front desk know, and someone will get back to you. Do not begin a project without the form accepted. If you are in a time bind, let the front office know.

Finally, if you plan to paint your home, take a look at the color chart available at the front desk which offers suggestions for color combinations, etc. The chart has colors for the exterior of your home as well as for trim, etc. There are many options and if you can't find one you like, speak to a LARC member and we'll try to work something out.

KCCA Clubhouse Parking Lot Update

The concrete demolition and construction are complete. The striping of the main Clubhouse parking lot is completed, arrows and other pavement markings are due to be finished when the other two lots are striped. The sealing and striping of the Arts & Crafts and Pro Shop parking lots was scheduled for September 16-19, however the weather interfered and that had to be canceled.

We do not know when the contractor will reschedule given the unpredictability of the weather this time of year. We do know we will receive very little notice and may need to close both lots at once if a nice day makes it possible to get the work done. If at all possible, the work will be staged to keep two lots open for parking. Once the striping has been completed in all lots, signs and parking stops can be placed so the final inspection can take place.

Notice of parking lot closures will be posted in the Announcements on the home page of our web site (mykcca.com). KCCA Club and Board Committee contacts are notified of updates and closures by email so they can notify their members. If we receive enough notice from the contractors performing the work, signs will also be posted at the front entrances of the Clubhouse, Arts & Crafts Building and Pro Shop. The best place to check for any urgent KCCA information is the Announcements section of the home page of mykcca.com.



King City Water Aerobics Club

The seasons are changing! The kids and grandkids are back in school. The leaves are changing colors and falling to the ground. And the King City outdoor pool is closing for the season.

Changing seasons might also mean changing your exercise routines. You might rake those leaves off your yard. You might enjoy a walk around the neighborhood hoping the rain holds off a bit longer. Better yet... go check out whatever it is that the Water Aerobics Club does in that lovely King City Aguatic Center.

Water Aerobics Club meets at the Aquatic Center at 8:00 a.m. or 6:30 a.m. Monday through Friday. We are led through a series of exercises in the pool by an audio recording. The exercises are relatively easy to do and are a great way to 'ease' into an exercise plan. Exercising in waist-deep to chest-deep water is easier on the joints than working out on dry land or even on a treadmill. All the exercises allow individuals to

decide for themselves how fast to move or how high to kick. Everyone is encouraged to do whatever it is their body allows them to do and just keep moving. It is not necessary to know how to swim to participate. Many exercises are done at the side of the pool where you can hang on with at least one hand.

Exercising in the pool is great! It's more fun than raking leaves or trudging in the cold rain. Just come on into the pool at 8:00 a.m. or 6:30 p.m. and participate. If you need some assistance with any particular exercise, ask the person closest to you in the water. We want you to feel included and comfortable asking for assistance. Some of the exercises call for the use of a ball. Members have the free use of balls or water noodles that are stored in a cabinet on the pool deck. Several members prefer to bring and use their own floating water-exercise equipment.

Try water aerobics a few times. If you decide to make it a regular thing, please get a Water Aerobics Club registration form. Take one



from the bulletin board just inside and to the right of the entry door, or ask a Club member to get one for you. Fill it out completely and return it to one of the Club's officers with your \$5.00 dues fee.

Keep in mind that the rules established by the King City Board of Directors, the King City Pool Committee, and the State of Oregon are there for the health and safety of everyone. Please abide by all the rules and regulations necessary for continued safe use of the Aquatic Center.

- 1. The first swimming pool to go to sea on an ocean liner was installed on the White Star Line's Adriatic in 1907.
- 2. The oldest stroke is the breaststroke. Swimming has a history that dates as far back as the 1st century BCE. We know this because ancient

- drawings and paintings have been found in Egypt depicting people swimming dating back to 2500 BC.
- Swimmers lose just as much sweat in the pool as any other athlete loses on land. There is, however, not enough research to tell us how much sweat swimmers actually lose in the water.
- Most of the nation's population cannot swim. A 2014 American Red Cross survey revealed that half of Americans cannot swim. Fifty-five percent of Americans can perform 5 basic swimming skills.
- Swimming burns more calories than running or biking. Biking burns around 483 an hour and running burns 557. Swimming at a fast rate can burn up to 784 calories in a single hour.
- 6. The bikini swimsuit was named

after a US nuclear testing site in the South Pacific Called Bikini Atoll.

7. The average person produces 25,000

- quarts of saliva throughout their lifetime, which is enough to fill two swimming pools.
- 8. Swimming gives you a full body workout. Not only does swimming burn calories, it improves flexibility, strengthens your heart and lungs and strengthens all your major muscles. It also aids in mental wellbeing! That is what I call a workout!
- The turbo-pump on the space shuttle's main engine is strong enough to drain an average-sized swimming pool in less than 25 seconds.
- 10. Swim fins were invented by Benjamin Franklin.
- 11. Elephants use their trunks as natural snorkels and can swim as much as 20 miles a day.
- 12. The fastest and most efficient swim stroke is the crawl/freestyle.




The little Dutch community of Verboort will celebrate it's 85th year of making sausage, sauerkraut,

Time to Start Planning Your Holiday Party! (Room Rental FAQ, Part 1)

Your Clubs & Amenities Committee is hard at work on some proposals to make the KCCA public rooms easier for residents to rent for special parties and events. So, we thought now would be a good time to go over some of the questions and comments that often come up around room rentals.

Why do we have to pay to rent rooms at all? Don't we pay an annual assessment? Why doesn't that cover it?

Our annual assessment covers general upkeep and cleaning of all KCCA buildings. Think of it like the post office – we all pay taxes, and that pays for the post offices and trucks and staff. But if you want to send a letter, you need to buy a stamp. Or if you want to ship a package, you need to pay a fee based on its weight and destination.

If the post office tried to make it so all that was covered by our taxes, too, the taxes would go way up. Plus, since the number of letters and packages varies from year to year, it would be hard to get the tax amount right.

The same concept applies here – to provide rooms for special events free of charge, we'd all need to pay a much higher annual assessment. And, since the number of rooms used would vary from year to year, it would be hard to calculate the correct assessment amount.

Why do we have to clean up after an event? Don't we have a cleaning staff for that?

Same as above. Plus, is there any venue anywhere that lets you rent a space without cleaning up after yourself,

even if that venue pays a cleaning staff?

If I rent a room I have

exclusive right to it, yes?

Well, yes...mostly, though you might be called on to make a neighborly accommodation now and then. For example, if you've rented the living room and the kitchen, and someone else has rented the banquet room, they'll need to pass through "your" living room or kitchen to get to "their" banquet room. Similarly, if you've rented the banquet room and kitchen, and someone else has rented the living room, they might want to use "your" kitchen sink to rinse out cups or something.

We strongly encourage members to be kind to those who might need to make a small incursion on "their" rented space. And, we strongly encourage members to respect our neighbors' rented space, and not enter it unless there's really, truly no alternative.

Can non-residents rent rooms? Can non-residents pay for the rental?

Only KCCA resident members can rent KCCA rooms. The resident member renter is the party responsible for the event. Thus, they must sign and submit the rental form, and they must be present for the entire event. However, all the rest of the attendees can be non-residents, as long as the renting resident member is present. Similarly, it doesn't matter who pays, as long as someone does, and as long as the renting resident member has signed the form agreeing to be responsible.

Can children attend private events?

OF COURSE! Children, accompanied and supervised by a responsible adult, are always welcome in the KCCA rental spaces! Of course, we're responsible

for our guests, and if any of them (children or otherwise) cause damage or other problems, then we'll have to deal with the consequences. But there's no ban on children at private events.

Why do I need to buy event insurance if I serve alcohol at my event?

Alcohol greatly increases the risks of any endeavor, at least from the point of view of insurance companies. Adding alcohol to an event in a KCCA rental space increases the risk beyond what KCCA's insurance covers, and so we have to supplement it with insurance of our own.

You can refer to Resolution 2012-202 for more information about alcohol at events on KCCA properties. You can either add event insurance to your own homeowner's policy, or purchase it separately from another company. The insurance company that KCCA uses has provided them a contact for event insurance, so if you'd like, you can contact the office for that contact. Keep in mind, though, that this doesn't mean that KCCA endorses that contact.
