The Administrator will oversee the Council, and the Administrative Assistant will help in the logistics of getting the newsletter to the publisher.

The Council has established some basic guidelines for all to follow to keep the newsletter informative, accurate, and, most of all, a positive and enjoyable publication.

The guidelines that the Council will operate under are as follows:

- The submittal timeline for the newsletter will be the 1st Friday of every month. This will give the Council time to review each article. Articles received after the deadline will be reviewed for publication in the following month's newsletter.
- 2) Articles must be positive in nature.
- While no content will be altered, articles will be edited for grammar and punctuation.
- 4) A guideline for length is, keep your article short enough to retain the reader's attention. A rule of thumb is ¼ to ½ page on an 8 ½ X 11 size paper. (approximately 200-400 words)
- 5) Articles should be submitted to **info@mykcca.com**.
- 6) Articles not in line with these

guidelines will be returned to the author, who can choose to edit their article for resubmission.

NAC is seeking resident's that can assist in bringing the monthly newsletter to life. Writing skills are not necessary. What is needed are individuals who are willing to find articles of interest. LARC Request Process Reminder

With summer in full swing, it's a great time to get those home improvement projects done. Remember, though, that if you're improving the exterior of your home, you need to get written approval from the Landscape and Architectural Review and Compliance (LARC) committee first. This is a really important step. If you skip it, you might have to postpone your work or even remove or redo what you started. And, believe me, no one wants that!

To start the project approval process, stop by the clubhouse and pick up a LARC Project Request Form from the forms rack on the outside of the building, near the door, or you can find the form our the KCCA website mykcca.com. Once your form is completed, simply drop it in the lockbox next to the rack. The office staff and the LARC committee are working hard to ensure these requests are processed in a timely manner.

Here are some things to know when filling out the form:

- The section about checking with your neighbors is very important and can help save you trouble down the line.
- Make your description of the project as detailed as possible, including the types of materials you'll use.
- When submitting for architectural approval, especially for fences, landscaping, enclosures, always submit a plan with your improvement marked. This can be as simple as your own drawing, or as complex as full architectural blueprints.
- For exterior paint colors, include swatches of your paint and trim colors. You can check with the KCCA office for an approved paint color chart.



 For roofs, submit a sample of your shingle or roofing material.





My wife and I foster kittens for a great organization, Meow Village (www.meowvillage.org). A few months ago, we were given a speck of a kitten to foster. He weighed less than a pound. This is his story.

Kittens, especially tiny, once feral kittens, can crash quickly, and that's what happened to Milo one morning. He was very dehydrated, and my wife rushed to the vet to get fluids for us to administer at home. As soon as Mary left, Milo's body began to feel cool to the touch. I called Meow Village and was told to put Karo syrup on his gums. The only problem was I had none, and no car. I called my neighbor, who rushed to the store and was back at my door in ten minutes.

As soon as Mary got home, we administered the fluids, but Milo was still going downhill fast. We rushed him to the vet, where he would stay

for two nights. His prognosis was grim. The vet was not sure he would survive.

In desperation, I posted to Nextdoor, asking for prayers for Milo. Immediately, people we didn't know, as well as many of our friends in King City, began to post their thoughts and prayers.

Two days later, we were told that they were going to remove Milo from his glucose drip and see if he could survive on his own. At noon I was able to post: "We are bringing Milo home!"

To our surprise, the NextDoor posts didn't stop. If we didn't post for a day, people would ask for an update. On July 26, we took Milo to his permanent home. Our hearts break a little bit every time we have to say goodbye to a foster, and this one was especially hard. Milo hadn't only stolen our hearts but a whole community's.

As for us, we're working with a new pair of foster kittens, preparing to have our hearts broken anew.





Aquatic Center one-year Envelope Inspection



During November 2019 the Aquatic Center underwent a lengthy one-year building envelope inspection, which is vital to ensure proper air and moisture movement in or out of the building. Envelope inspections often reveal structural problems or defects that need immediate correction for the structural integrity of the building and the safety of its occupants. Other times, inspections reveal smaller building defects that can be corrected prior to larger problems developing.

Our one-year inspection found both potential structural defects and smaller construction defects had occurred. On February 5, 2020, the Board voted unanimously to file a lawsuit against the General Contractor for construction defects found during the inspection. Since the filing of the lawsuit, the contractor's plumber re-braced all the shower handles, replaced the Family Room ADA toilet, and re-vented the recirculating water heaters to meet specs. As of this writing we're continuing to address the remaining defects with the General Contractor and their insured.
