Thanksgiving! I remember it was fun, hectic, crowded, and exhausting. You see, I had 11 siblings, 6

boys, and 5 girls. We never all lived together because my oldest sisters were grown and in high school when my family up and moved to Peoria, Illinois from a little town outside of Hannibal, Missouri about 1955. My two older sisters stayed with friends in Missouri to finish high school. That left two teenage boys, an older sister, my younger sister, and 2 younger boys (soon to be two more) to make it 11 in the family, Usually, there were 10 of us for meals including mom and dad. We were poor and didn't know it. We always had a big round oak table with 3 leaves. Even with the table opened to the fullest, we couldn't all fit around it so some of us ate on the couch or chairs in the living room and some sat on a bunk bed in what used to be the dining room that was turned into a bedroom for the boys.

Thanksgiving Dinner was usually what my Dad and older brothers got while hunting or fishing. I remember one year it was Raccoon on the menu and on another, venison was roasted. The most festive was if Dad and brothers shot a goose or two. Mom would roast them to a golden brown and with the addition of mashed potatoes, candied sweet potatoes, green beans gravy, and pie. It was a feast. The laughter and camaraderie were deafening at times. We didn't care if we ate turkey or chicken or coon. It was a holiday and by golly we celebrated.

As we got older and left home to go out into the world, we would establish different customs for our families, but Thanksgiving at Mom and Dad's was always an open invitation if we chose to attend with our families. That added around 15 kids and 6 more adults to the already boisterous crowd. Now we spread out to the floor in the living room and the bunk bed in the girls' room as well as the boy's room to have a place to sit. Balancing a plate became a great trick. Doing the dishes was a task that we girls all pitched in with.

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Plant In The Fall For A Gift In The Spring

Have you ever planted a healthy shrub and then watch it struggle to survive? So much of that pain can be avoided if we follow the "right plant, right place" philosophy. This means that you decide not to fight the shade or sun in your garden, but choose the plant that will thrive in the existing conditions. "Right plant, right place" is sound advice that, if given and heeded early enough, prevents beginners from pulling their hair out.

During this time of year, we will even add to that prudent advice: "right plant, right place...at the right time! For those of us new to the gardening game, you may not

realize that fall is the absolute best time for planting.

Fall Really Is The Best Time To Do Your Landscape Planting.

Take advantage and extend yourplanting season this year. The ground is still warm and the welcome rainy days will give a newly planted tree or shrub a chance to establish its roots before winter sets in. According to Al's Growing Guide on the Advantages of Fall Planting, the cool evenings, and eventually cooler days of autumn, will slow down the loss of moisture through 'transpiration' (plants' loss of water through their leaves). New plantings don't dry out as quickly as in the intense spring sun. The soil is still warm, until a cold soaking rain, and warmth encourages root development.

Planting in the withering summer heat can take its toll and Oregon gardeners seem to prefer getting out into the crisp autumn air to dig in the dirt and experience the changing seasons from the front row. Just be sure to plant six weeks before the ground freezes - any time before mid-November should be safe.

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November Home Landscape of the Month

This month's landscape belongs to Patty McEvoy on Queen Ann. Patty and her husband Donald moved here from Tillamook in 2013. She lives with a sweet lump of a white dog named Snow.

Sweet Potato Pie

- 1 lb sweet potato
- 1/2 cup butter softened
- ½ cup white sugar
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- ½ milk
- 2 large eggs
- ½ tsp ground nutmeg (use fresh if possible!)
- ½ tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 (9 inch) unbaked pie crust (store-bought if you must)

Boil sweet potato whole in skin for 40 minutes or until tender. Allow to cool and remove the skin.

Break up the potato in a mixing bowl. Add butter and mix well with an electric mixer. Stir in sugar, milk, eggs, nutmeg, cinnamon, and vanilla. Beat on medium speed until the mixture is smooth. Pour into an unbaked pie crust.

Bake at 350 for 55 mins or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean. The pie should puff up like a souffle and then will sink down as it cools.

Side note 1: you can cover the edge of the crust with foil the first 30 mins to keep the color even.

Side note 2: you can make individual mini pies if you would like but bring the cooking time down accordingly.

This is a bit of a North Carolina specialty and when done right will beat out pumpkin pie every time!

My other recipe choice for this article was Brunswick stew which my father made every fall. A traditional Brunswick stew must include a head of a pig, boiled of course. I felt the sweet potato pie was a better choice.

You can always google the stew if you're interested!
