the BOARD MAN

The board meeting scheduled for 5/25 has been replaced with the Annual Members Meeting. To avoid multiple weeks in between the next few board meetings the board meeting scheduled for 6/8 has been moved to 6/1.

The Board approved the following proposals:

All Phase Painting to paint the walls in the women's outdoor activities restroom. Cost not to exceed \$800 to be taken from the Operations budget under maintenance.

Parish Enterprises to replace the rotted barge boards and paint the fascia boards at the Crown Center for a cost not to exceed \$1,500, to be taken from the reserve budget. This is an unplanned repair and not included in the 2021 reserve budget but is a result of the approved roof and gutter repair included in the 2021 reserve budget.

Purchase a Kubota tractor to replace the expired John Deere tractor at a

cost not to exceed \$27,688 which is included in the 2021 approved reserve budget for \$30,120.77.

Replace the leaking heat exchanger for the large pool at the aquatic center as proposed by Cascade Pools for a cost not to exceed \$3,251.00. Funds to be taken from the reserve budget; this is an unplanned repair and not included in the 2021 reserve budget.

Repair the aquatic center locker rooms in accordance with the bid proposal, with a not to exceed amount of \$200,000. This matter did not come before the Finance Committee, nor was there discussion during the open board meeting because this matter is under litigation. \$125,000 of this repair was included in the 2021 reserve budget.

Obtain proposals to conduct a 2022 Level 1 Reserve Study, to be included in the 2022 budget. No cost involved in this matter at this time.

Finance/Budget

The Board agreed to hold off further discussions regarding the perceived financial anomalies by the budget committee for January, February and/or March until the audit is done and CAP (management company) is implemented as some of the perceived anomalies may actually be due to the modified accrual reporting method being used. It will take CAP at least 3 months for the financial transition. CAP will be working with the KCCA CPA (Schwindt) to ensure a smooth transition, audit, and accurate financial reporting for 2021.

There was a discussion of what the future role of the budget and/ or finance committee may be after Community Association Partners management company (CAP) transition is completed. Part of CAP's role is to assist the Board with tasks to include preparing the annual budget and financial records, financial reporting, participate in the annual audit, manage notification and collection of assessments including collections and pay Association expenditures.

Resident Member Spotlight: Alma Hanna

KCCA MUSIC CLUB CHORUS PORTRAIT

This is the second article of a series spotlighting a talented member of our KCCA Music Club Chorus. Each of our members has interesting backgrounds, some with professional experience. When not limited by the current pandemic, the chorus performs the first Monday of every month at 2:00 PM in the Clubhouse.

We have our own "Coal Miner's Daughter" right here in King City! Alma Hanna was born just before the great depression descended on our country, in a small, rural coal-mining town in Iowa. She was the youngest of 12 children, and her father died when she was 5, from complications of a head injury. five children were grown when he died, and several already had families of their own before Alma was born. She said they were poor, but she didn't realize it, and was happy. All of her family loved music and sang, but no one but she did any performing. She was married right out of high school, had four kids, and then was divorced once the kids were out of high school.

She remarried but was widowed in 1984. During her years in the small town, her only musical outlet was with the church, so she sang from the sacred repertoire, for weddings and funerals. In her mid-30s, opportunities opened up in a couple of towns that weren't too far away. The county seat town, 15 miles away, put an audition notice in the local newspaper, for "Oklahoma." She tried out, and was awarded the part of "Laurie," the lead. The next year they did "South Pacific" and she was in the chorus. She evidently had been heard by someone in another town, and was asked in person by the director and accompanist of the "Aeolian Singers" to audition, and got the part of Maria in "The Sound of Music." "That was the highlight of my musical performances," she said.

After she remarried, they moved to Missouri for a while, where her husband was a school teacher. Then they moved to Chattahoochee, Florida, and bought a small meat market business. After a year, he went back to teaching, and Alma organized and produced variety shows for school fund-raisers. This involved persuading prominent local folks, who had never before perfomed, to appear in chorus lines. Her time in Florida was about 5

years, up to 1984 when her husband died. She then moved back to Kansas City, Missouri, where a daughter lived. She lived there for a few years, then moved on to Spokane, where another daughter lived. In 1999, she rented a house in King City, and then bought the condo where she now lives in 2004. So she's been a King City resident for 22 years.

Ten years ago the KCCA Music Club was formed, and Alma was one of the earliest members. Ever since, KCCA audiences have been entertained by her monthly solos at our first-Monday concerts in the clubhouse. She, along with all of us Music Club members, have missed our singing together during this past year's shutdown, and we hope soon to be able to revive our chorus.

KCCA Reopening – Getting Close!

As of today, May 26th, no reopening date has been set. However, the House and C&A Committees have presented their recommendations to the Board. The main recommendation is to have all the buildings be open the same days and hours in the beginning. Hours would be Monday – Friday, 9:00 am

to 4:00 pm, which would allow us to handle any technical issues with the entry system during normal business hours. Further reopening details will be resolved before a final decision is made.

The C&A Committee is sending out a Restart Application to the clubs,

which includes general guidelines. C&A will work to assign clubs time slots within whatever hours are approved by the Board. They will be using the January 2020 Activities Calendar as a starting point.

Ben & Jax






Cashew Chicken Salad

INGREDIENTS

- 14-oz spiral multi-colored pasta
- 4 cups cooked cubed chicken, about 4 breasts.
- · 2 stalks celery, diced
- 6 chopped green onions
- ½ green pepper
- 1 ½ cup mayonnaise
- ¼ cup brown sugar
- 1 tbs cider vinegar
- 1 ½ tsp lemon juice
- 1½ tsp salt

PREPARATION

Cook and cool pasta as directed. Add cubed chicken and vegetables. Mix mayo, brown sugar, vinegar, lemon juice and salt in bowl; stir into pasta. Cover and refrigerate at least two hours or overnight. Add chopped cashews before serving.



King City Ceramic Club

The King City Ceramic Club provides a supportive learning group as well as a social group where members explore different aspects of ceramics. Most members buy their ware from ceramics shops in the area, but some create objects from scratch using clay and others use slip (liquid clay) and plaster of Paris molds.

The ware is painted either with glaze, which is fired in our kiln, or with acrylic paint. Glazed items work well in the dishwasher and last longer in outside weather. Acrylic paint, the same paint that artists use, provides better detail work. Some members are interested in producing beautiful products, either for themselves or as gifts. Some are artists. Some are more interested in experimenting with various colors and techniques.

There are no classes or formal instructions, but members share their experience. We also have several books and brochures that can give new members a head start.

We are also a social group, and we enjoy each other. A pot of coffee is a necessity. Members often share snacks. We have a monthly birthday party and occasional lunches together. (That's what we miss most now.)

We don't know how old the ceramics club is. (Any information appreciated!) The oldest memory places us as an active thriving club 33 years ago. The room was expanded, and wall protection added for the kilns in the mid-90s. A few years ago, we expanded slightly when the defunct jewelry club relinquished its space. That area is used for the "dirty" work,

to keep clay dust away from the painting. We have hand-built tables with "cubbies" for personal supplies. These and our cabinets may have been built by woodshop club members, including spouses of former ceramic club members.

In normal times, the club meets in the ceramic room in the Arts & Crafts Building on Tuesdays and Thursdays between 9-12. Last spring, the ceramic room was available to members when the building was open (with strict cleaning and other Covid restrictions). Membership is limited by the number of available seats and is limited to KCCA residents. In normal times, we welcome anyone to stop by and say "hi", and to enjoy our changing collection of ceramic projects in the display windows opposite the building doors.
