Aquatic Center Repair Update (as of 8/7/2024)

Submitted by the Board of Directors Aquatic Center Repair Liaisons



While it might seem like nothing is happening, a great deal is going on in the beginning stages of our pool building repair and dehumidifier replacement planning. We have received all settlement money from the mediation. Mike Ceccanti. Rob Peters and Cherie Gilmore-Forczak are the Board of Directors' Aquatic Center Repair Liaisons who oversee the process. We are

dealing with two separate repair issues.

The first is the **Aquatic Center** building. We have signed a contract with Forensic Building Consultants and will be working

directly with Toby White, who was the expert witness hired by our attorney when we were in litigation. We are meeting with him weekly by Zoom and will continue to do so throughout the repair process. We are currently in the Construction Documents phase. Toby is in the process of developing written specifications and design drawings for the repairs. We should have

those shortly. We will go over them and then meet with Toby to see if changes are needed. We then move to the vetting/bidding stage for contractors. Toby will handle all aspects of receiving bids from reputable contractors, and then we will make the final decisions.

The second repair issue pertains to the dehumidifier. We have selected JH Kelly for the removal of the old dehumidifier and installation of the new one. They were involved in the investigation of the faulty dehumidifier during the litigation process and have made necessary repairs along the way. They are authorized installers of the Seresco dehumidifier. They will follow the manufacturer's instructions on installation. The new dehumidifier is expected to be shipped in October. We will keep you updated.

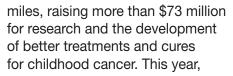

King City Rider Rides in 6th Great Cycle Challenge USA

Bill Hood will ride 400 miles during September in support of Children's Cancer Research Fund.

Bill Hood, a resident of King City, is planning to ride 400 miles and

raise \$2,500 during
September for Children's
Cancer Research Fund
(CCRF) in support of
its 10th annual Great
Cycle Challenge USA.
Founded in 2015, Great
Cycle Challenge USA
has grown to become
one of the biggest
cycling events in the
country. In just nine
years, over 500,000
riders from 50 states
have ridden 33.8 million



CCRF hopes over 30,000 riders will help raise more than \$9 million.

"Over 15,000 American children are diagnosed with cancer every year and, sadly, 38 children die every week," said Kenna Dooley, Chief Development Officer at Children's Cancer Research Fund. "Thanks to riders like Bill, we're fueling groundbreaking research to save lives and give kids the brighter future they deserve."

"This is the sixth time I have participated in the Great Cycle Challenge," said Bill Hood. "During those years, I rode 2,323 miles and raised \$10,104.96. 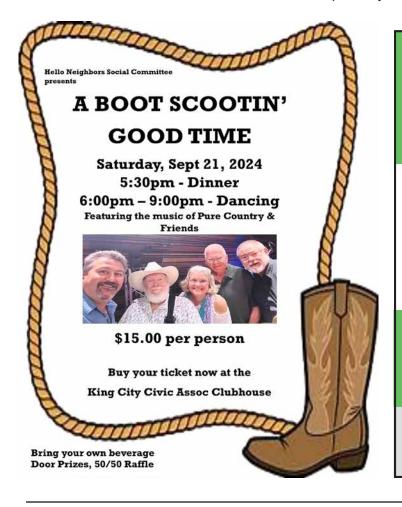
Our July field trip was to a lovely, family-owned nursery in Canby called Green Seed Gardens. This is a fairly new nursery, as it was started about ten years ago as a landscape service dedicated to sustainability. It has evolved into a nursery over the past six years since moving to Canby. They are a certified naturally grown nursery, and the business is continuing to grow, with future plans to have events at the farm, in addition to selling plants to customers. Both Emily and Austin are very friendly and eager to impart their wisdom to help us grow our flowers and shrubs. Their farm carries Northwest natives as well as some unusual plants. After the tour of the farm, we concluded the trip by having lunch at the Filbert Farmhouse Kitchen in Aurora. A lot of us decided that this one trip was not enough... we will return for another visit!

For anyone who has experienced their shrubs and/or flowers injured by the recent heat waves, OSU Extension Service has recommendations for what to do with these plants that have been heat damaged:

Go ahead and cut off dead flowers, but try to resist the urge to remove partially dead leaves and certainly, don't do any hard pruning right now. The leaves (whether dead or alive) will shade foliage that wasn't burned and allow the undamaged leaves to continue photosynthesis. Pruning



is bad because it forces new growth that can be damaged if there is another heat wave, plus it creates a place where diseases and pests can enter the plant. And, if it is spring-blooming plants like rhododendrons that you cut back, this will cut off the buds for next year's flowers.

LARC Luminations

Welcome to the newest addition to our KCCA newsletter. Our goal is to help educate and communicate the Landscape and Architecture Review Committee's (LARC) purpose and goals. We will also provide periodic updates and helpful tips.

LARC Basics: The LARC Committee is charged with the review of construction and modification of properties - e.g., house painting, roof replacements, renovations, solar panels, sheds, fences and more. LARC is also tasked with ensuring properties remain neat, tidy and safe - shrubbery trimmed to provide clear views for emergency personnel, easily navigable and clean sidewalks and curbs.

Did you know? What is the current focus for LARC?: Safety is our current priority. Our focus is on walkways and curbs, which are clear of debris, overgrown shrubs, weeds, and moss. Many residents have balance and mobility issues. We want to ensure they, too, may safely enjoy a walk around our neighborhood without a trip or fall incident. Our other focus is sight lines from the street to the front of your home so that emergency personnel may clearly view your property.

May I install solar panels on my roof? For projects that require approval (consult the CC&Rs and Resolutions - mykcca.com. Please complete a LARC Project Request form located on our Forms page on the KCCA website mykcca.com. (members will need to log in to access this page). Please be advised that some

projects require both KCCA and King City approvals.

I saw a sidewalk and curb with overgrown weeds. Who do I notify? The KCCA Office at office@mykcca.com; 503.639.6565 or the LARC Committee – cmccollough@mykcca.com or Mary Maney at mkmaney01@msn.com.

Asking for a neighbor who is no longer able to pull weeds and maintain their lawn – is help available? LARC is putting together a resource list of volunteer groups who will be available to assist homeowners. Please contact LARC for more info or if you know of a group (scout troops, church youth groups, service clubs, etc.) willing to serve. We hope to have this information available in the next few months.

Emergency Readiness Team

Strength in readiness, safety in preparation

Emergency Pantry

We are not immune from a major event that could cause structural damage, blocked roads, extended power outages, or flooding, all of which could affect our ability to obtain the food and water we need.

Preparing for such an emergency with the right non-perishable foods will prove invaluable. Ideally, the long-term goal is to store enough food for your family for six months. But start small, with a one-to-two-week supply, then extend it.

How you stock your emergency pantry will depend on your financial resources, storage space, and food preferences. You might assemble an extensive array of regular food items or invest in commercially prepared emergency food kits. Either way, such stressful times will call for a balanced diet to maintain your strength. Have foods that are proteinrich, high energy, with fats, carbs, and vitamins.

If you build your supply from regular food items, consider canned meat or fish, jerky, peanut butter, soups, whole grain crackers, rice, enriched pasta, instant potatoes, seasonings, shelf-stable (UHT) milk or powdered milk, canned beans/veggies, dried fruit, nuts, protein bars, chocolate bars, instant coffee/tea, powdered beverages.

Keep a list of your emergency pantry foods with expiration dates and go through them every six to twelve months, pulling items for timely use and replacement.

Additional Items to store: TP,

paper towels, paper plates/bowls/ cups, flatware, manual can opener, and Sterno canned heat. Have accessible: knives, pans, fondue pot, camp stove and propane, BBQ grill.

Storage areas can be challenging in small homes, apartments, and condos. Consider adding a 'low shelf' in an existing closet (sort of a 'false floor'), store items under a bed, or make use of those awkwardly high kitchen cabinet shelves.

Have family pets? Keep a 14day+ supply of pet food on hand, as well as a water bowl, treats, an extra leash, chew toy, medicine, vaccination record, a litter box and carrier, and a photo of your pet.
